12. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year(maximum five bullets)

To enhance entrepreneurial skills, Diploma in Beauty and Wellness under the UGC community College Programme under the NSQF Scheme was introduced on 09.08.2018. • Local Chapter of NPTEL Swayam was established in the college on 19 December 2018 enable the students as well as the faculty to upgrade their knowledge and skills. The total enrolment for the year was 359 and the MOOC courses for which enrolment took place included courses such as Speaking Effectively, Human Molecular Genetics, Animal Physiology, Biochemistry, Emotional Intelligence, and Medicinal Chemistry. • A seven day National Workshop on "Research Methods and Techniques for Quality Publications" was organized in collaboration with Association for Research and Advanced Studies from 03.01.2019 to 09.01.2019 with the objective to enhance the research acumen of the faculty. Eminent resource persons Dr. Rudra Rameshwar from Thapar University, Dr. Ajay Chauhan from IMT Ghaziabad and Dr. Tejinder Pal Singh from UBS, Chandigarh gave hands on training to 40 participants on various advanced research techniques and also gave useful tips on writing quality research papers for publication in quality journals. • A One day International seminar on "Redefining Morals and Ethics: Towards Transformative Global Citizenship Education for the 21st Century" was organized on 06.02.2019. The faculty, scholars and researchers from various universities and research and educational institutes of India and abroad participated in the seminar. S. Ajaib Singh Chatha, Chairman Punjab Business Professional Association and WPC, Canada presented the keynote address. Eminent luminaries S. Sardool Singh, Executive, Vice President, WPC, Canada, S. Karanajaib Singh Sangha, Executive, WPC, Canada, Dr. Jaswinder Singh, Principal, SGTB, University of Delhi and Dr. Harbans Singh, SGTB, University of Delhi deliberated on various issues pertaining to significance of ethics in creating positive environment. Rampant and unchecked exposure of the youth to violence through the media resulting in adverse effect on the young minds was discussed. They stressed that the values of love and compassion should be imbibed in the learners so as to make them committed towards their families, society, country and the world. • IQAC of the college added another dimension to its responsibilities by establishing a Student Research Centre. A five day workshop on "Project Report Writing and Discovering Statistics through Excel" was organized from 28.05.2019 to 01.06.2019 for the students of Business Administration. The objective of the workshop was to inculcate research orientation among students and guide them regarding preparation of their project reports to be submitted in the final year of their graduation. As many as 65 students of BBA participated in this workshop.

All the departments of the college have been provided with ICT facility along with internet access and WiFi facility to aid them in faster and efficient accomplishment of their day to day tasks. The administrative staff uses customized software installed in the office to maintain digital databases of the students and faculty and thereby carry out all the administrative and accounts related tasks effectively and efficiently. The college library is also automated. The library digital databases are regularly updated.
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## **CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The institution is affiliated to Panjab University, so it adopts the curriculum overview provided by the university. The college has developed a structured mechanism for effective curriculum delivery and documentation. The planning process begins with the Pre-Semester Planning where the departmental heads calculate the workload and distribute it as per the subject expertise as they carry out the task of Time Table formulation. The Academic Calendar is formulated by the IQAC followed by the Modular Plans/Lesson Plans /Teaching Plans at the departmental level. The Semester Activities include Orientation programme for students before starting with the regular class room teaching and mentoring tutorials. There are a plethora of student enrichment activities e.g. seminars, special talks etc. along with outreach activities like field tours, educational excursions etc.Regular class tests are taken every month followed by Mid Semester Exams. Remedial and tutorial classes are organized for students according to their needs. Post Semester Activities include collection and documentation of student feedback and submission of internal assessment. In an attempt to increase the efficiency of curriculum delivery, the institution promotes the adoption of learner centric teaching tools and techniques such as power presentation, group discussions, internships and role playing. For the up gradation of subject-related knowledge, guest lectures, seminars, expert lectures of eminent academicians, conferences, exhibitions and work shops are organized. The college has departmental libraries along with a very rich central library with open access system for the benefit of the students. A good number of journals (Science, Arts and Commerce) are subscribed to. Inflibnet (ebooks and e-journals) facility is also available for staff and students. Access to the data base like MathSciNet is also available through N List facility. A Detailed Record of the classes, assessments, project reports and tests etc is maintained by the Respective Departments . Each teacher is provided with an academic diary to record timetable, workload, semester teaching plan, actual teaching units and academic and administrative responsibilities carried out. The academic diary is monitored by the concerned Head of Department and the Principal of the college. The annual results are documented by the respective departments. The Office Of The Registrar compiles the documentation from all departments. The records of all lectures delivered, attended and shortage of attendance, if any is recorded in detail. The parents are made aware of their ward's status. Further, the Mid semester tests are arranged and held and the results compiled and report cards showing the progress of the students are made and shared with the parents. The Internal Assessment of all students is compiled and recorded and sent to the University. IQAC keeps a vigilant eye on the results, departmental proceedings and student's performance and also keeps a record of the different activities of the college regarding teaching and learning. The Activity Committee documents the details of all the academic and para academic activities held in the college. Further, the departments also document their working in detailed Departmental Reports which are maintained by the IQAC of the college.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

A special Feedback Committee has been constituted and assigned the task of obtaining the feedback and further analyzing it so that it can be utilized for the overall development of the students, faculty and the institution on the whole . The sample is chosen randomly, giving due representation to all streams in the college. The feedback committee collects and prepares analysis of feedback in relevant areas. The various parameters wherein the some aspect was initially found lacking or unsatisfactory are kept in mind. The lacunas are analyzed and reported to the IQAC which takes a note of the situation and recommends special customized measures to deal with these discrepancies and follows up with remedial measures. The valuable feedback from various stakeholders is reviewed and specific responses used to enhance academic outcome of the students. It is pertinent to note that teacher's feedback on student performance is complemented with student feed back The IQAC is cognizant of these reports and holds creative discussions on querries and improvement of teaching tools and student engagement. The feedback obtained from UG and PG students, parents, teachers and alumnae on a well structured questionnaire is meticulously scrutinized. The levels of satisfaction of the students and parents vis a vis parameters like student teachers relationship, infrastructure, learner centric teaching models, research opportunities for the students, research guidance, placement counseling etc. are garnered through the conduit of the feedback system and regular parent teacher meetings. Information collected regarding Teacher's satisfaction towards facilities and services provided by the college for creating conducive atmosphere for teaching and professional growth of the faculty. The feedback analysis reveals various viewpoints regarding how the college vision, philosophy and objectives are well reflected in college decisions. Every year Alumnae meet is organized in the college campus and provides an efficient mechanism for gathering feedback from the Alumnae. This year also, besides organizing a cultural gala, responses were sought with respect to campus environment, infrastructure, learning experience, academic initiatives along with student support facilities. The IQAC along with the office of the Registrar chalks out a plan of action for the next academic session to further improve the productivity and efficiency of various academic and administrative procedures of the college. Action plan is formulated for suggestions pertaining to long time changes which are monitored from time to time. Thus feedback is collected and analyzed thoroughly. The points of concern put forward are worked upon towards the betterment of the institution.

multifaceted manner. The mentoring process starts during the admissions itself. A detailed list of abilities, interests, and past experiences is made at the departmental levels. The students are mentored by the college faculty in assessing their skills and guided to venture into new enterprising activities based upon this knowledge. The faculty also help the financially weak students with course books, help books and fee concessions for a

smooth learning experience. In addition to this, the Weekly Tutorials provide a platform for personalized attention to students in small batches. The tutors are mentors who look into day to day problems of the students and carry out a detailed follow up of the performance of the student during their stay in the college. The Best Practices of the institution are aimed at mentoring the students by faculty and peers. The college has an elaborate orientation

programme for creating a firm foundation for an ideal teaching learning situation. It aims to introduce the newcomers to the rich traditions of KCW and to create bonding of newcomers with their seniors and teachers. It further aims to accentuate the academic and para academic fervor in the senior students while channelizing them to concrete goal setting and achievement. Customized Orientation Programs are thus designed by the college IQAC for the students at various levels of UG and PG courses. PAL or Peer Assisted Learning is an integral part of PETAL programme being run in the college and ventures to foster cross level support between students of various years. It aims at encouraging the students to support each other and learn cooperatively under the guidance from the senior students. The Placement Cell acts as the platform which opens up new avenues in the professional world to the students and brings big names of the corporate world at their doorstep for a better exposure. This one to one interaction with MNCs widens the horizons of the students and gives them a taste of the professional competitive world by way of experiencing working with them as trainees. The

Counseling Cell provides various comprehensive psychological services to students and helps resolve their emotional, behavioral, academic and social issues. It further provides one to one counseling for various personal, interpersonal and academic issues of the students and helps them realize their full potential. Career Coaching Cell caters to mentoring students by apprising them of the latest, dynamic career options available to them and the competitive tests that can be attempted by them, to make the best use of such opportunities. Remedial Classes and various types of extra classes are also offered by all departments to the students who need extra attention to excel in various courses.

#### 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Academically, all the students of the college are assessed on the basis of continuous internal evaluation system focusing on different criteria .Starting with the monthly class tests based on syllabus covered in that particular month on the special test copies which are kept in record, the students are further assessed on the basis of mid semester exams which are conducted in the middle of each semester and are of three hour duration. They are based on the same pattern as as the University exam and along with giving a feedback on the level of learning in the students, they also provide a practice for the final university examinations. The performance of the students is duly charted and followed up with their respective departments, tutorials and parents. Remedial classes are conducted for weak students in which they are given extra guidance. The brilliant students are given Extra Coaching which can increase their perception and insight to help them attempt their tests in a better way and excel in their exams.. After mid semester/ house exams, the Performance of the Students is duly charted by the Registrar Office. The respective Tutors prepare and distribute Report Cards to the students so that the parents are aware of their ward's progress. The Parent Teacher Meeting is conducted class wise for the weak students where interaction is carried out to strive to make the students perform better. The parents of students performing well are also

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic session is divided into two terms i.e Term I and Term II.The academic calendar is prepared term wise in accordance with the Panjab University norms and is strictly adhered to. The examinations are conducted twice to assess the students and to ensure continuous practice and hard work on their part. Special tests are also conducted for those who could not could not appear or fare well in the MSTs due to some unavoidable reasons. Term 1 started on 9th July, 2018 and ended on 7th December, 2018. The admission dates for the new session were from 9th July, 2018 to 24th July, 2018. Total number of working days were 97. Mid semester exams were from 4th Oct, 2018 till 13th Oct, 2018. End semester exams were from 8th Dec, 2018 to 24th Dec., 2018. Term II i.e. second semester began on 14th Jan, 2019 and ended on 9th May, 2019. Total Number of working days were 83. Mid semester exams were held from 4th April, 2019 to 12th April, 2019. End semester exams were conducted from 10th May, 2019 to 30th May, 2019. Special tests were conducted in the months of November and April.

4.4.2 - Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link) The lush green campus of KCW with well designed infrastructure provides a conducive learning environment to its students for effective learning to take place. The various Committees under the supervision of the IQAC of the college ensure proper maintenance and upkeep of all infrastructural facilities to stay in tune with the academic development. There are well laid out procedures and policies for purchase of any new goods and services. The maintenance work is assigned to the trained in house experts or outsourced to suitable agencies as per requirement. An Engineer and his team are duly appointed by the managing committee. They are responsible for all kinds of civil and electrical maintenance work as well as new construction projects in the college. Minor repair works are referred to the incampus workshop which has qualified and skilled manpower for civil work, electric work, plumbing, carpentry work and horticulture. A committed team of gardeners are responsible for the maintenance of college lawns and various other grounds used for various sports activities. The Computer Administrator is responsible for all the IT infrastructure of the college and ensures proper functioning of the various IT services and facilities provided in the college. Up gradation of classrooms, labs, Library, Computer labs, and other facilities is a regular feature of the college keeping										

in view the requirements and standards of new courses. The college Auditor ensures validity and legality of the financial records related to all types of purchases and maintenance work. Every department maintains a Stock Register of all types of items and services purchased. The financial records are further audited by a qualified Chartered Accountant who also counter signs all the financial reports and utilisation certificates of various grants received from various government agencies. There are specific committees like the Auditorium committee, the Furniture committee, Library Committee, the Write Off committee, the Purchase Committee, the Canteen Committee, the Hostel Committee and so on which are responsible for the maintenance and up gradation in their respective areas. The annual stock checking and periodic checks by faculty and technical staff helps in ensuring proper functioning and maintenance of various facilities. The college Seminar Hall and auditorium are utilised for the

multipurpose activities of the college for e.g. conducting seminars, exhibitions, functions, conferences, workshops, midterm and end semester exams, staff meetings, placement drives, alumni association meet etc. The open air theatre serves as a venue for departmental and cultural activities. The campus resources are also used for conducting of various competitive examinations. The vast play grounds, lawn tennis clay courts and basketball ground of the college provide for a platform to various sports coaching academies to train and polish the sports persons.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

Student Council of the college is the premier student body of the college which is responsible for coordination between the college and the students. Its objectives are to foster intellectual and cultural development of its members and to cultivate the qualities of leadership and organization among its members. In the session 2018 and 19 student council actively participated in Road Safety Rally on 16/09/2018. On 2/11/2018, Diwali cleanliness drive was organized by the council in the campus. Under Vigilance Awareness Week drive, council members organized a rally in November, 2018. The institute firmly believes that all the stakeholders are essentially the drivers of change and have a critical role to play in sustaining improved learning outcomes. The college has hence adopted a decentralised and participative mode of management. There is a clear leadership structure within the institution with explicit responsibilities for fostering quality teaching at each level. Two elected staff representatives and the Principal attend the meetings of the governing body of the college. The student council represents the student community and acts as an intermediary between students and faculty. The departmental work is coordinated by the respective HODs. The advisory committee comprising of senior most faculty members plays an important role in the planning and review of academic and administrative procedures. To ensure departmental autonomy, the departments are given freedom to finalize and schedule the departmental activities viz. extension lectures, seminars, expert talks, workshops, industrial visits, educational trips and academic and cultural activities in cognizance with the college academic calendar. Two faculty members are designated as Registrars (Examination). They are authorised to prepare the Academic calendar of the college in consultation with the Principal and departmental heads. They are responsible for planning, scheduling and implementation of the internal evaluation and examination scheme. Various committees (like Advisory Committee, Admission Committee, Library Committee, Canteen Committee, Hostel Committee etc.) clubs (such as Youth Club, Synapse

Community Club, Gardening Club, Eco Club, Traffic Club, Legal Literacy Club, Eloquence Club, Red Ribbon Club etc.) and cells (Anti Ragging Cell, Counseling Cell, Grievances Redressal Cell, Women Cell, Career Coaching Cell, Placement Cell etc.) have been vested with a number of organizational and functional responsibilities. They work in unison towards implementing the college vision and mission. Active participation of the Parent Teacher Association, Alumni Association and other stakeholders is also solicited to facilitate effective continuous quality improvement. This year, the following measures were additionally taken to augment faculty participation in the quality improvement process. 1. Formation of the PETAL Committee The college in its endeavor to promote excellence in teaching and learning launched PETAL (Programme for Excellence in Teaching and Learning).
